Boys Quarters Africa (BQA) is not just an idea; it was a necessary disruption, a burden and a catalyzing force for the delivery of Africa's destiny. For me, it was a call to rewrite the narrative for boys and young men across Africa, a vision to raise a generation of men who are equipped, enlightened, and empowered to build a world worth living. Today, that vision is no longer a dream—it is a movement.

This 5-Year Impact Report is more than numbers; it is the story of possibility. Over 500,000 boys engaged across five African countries, strategic collaborations with global partners—including the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in the Netherlands [OXFAM Voices]—mobilizing men as allies in ending violence against women and girls, and countless lives transformed in ways that can never fully be captured in metrics. But this is only the beginning.

The next phase of BQA is not just about impact—it is about systems change. Africa's deliverance will not come from quick fixes or wishful thinking. It requires something more—a fundamental shift in how we nurture values, empower leadership, and architect opportunities for the next generation. We are building that shift. 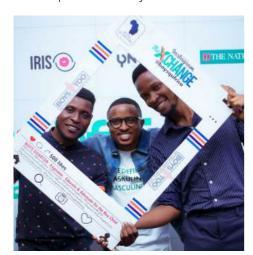

Our History

Boys Quarters Africa (BQA) was founded by Solomon O. Ayodele in 2018, to address a critical but often overlooked issue; the challenges faced by boys and young men in Africa. Many boys grow up with rigid societal expectations that force them to suppress emotions, embrace toxic masculinity, and navigate life without adequate support. This neglect has led to serious consequences, including higher school dropout rates, poor mental health, gender-based violence, and economic disempowerment. In Nigeria alone, suicide rates among men are four times higher than women's, and over 53% of young men are unemployed or underemployed. Recognizing these urgent issues, BQA was created as a movement to redefine masculinity, provide safe spaces for boys, and equip them with the tools to thrive in a rapidly changing world.

Since its inception, BQA has impacted over 500,000 boys and 2,500 men across Nigeria, Ghana, Zimbabwe, and South Africa through transformational programs. Our initiatives, such as BoysToo Campaign, Guyversations, Project SABI, and Leadership Bootcamp, have tackled issues ranging from emotional intelligence and mental health to leadership development and career readiness. Through mentorship, peer engagement, and community outreach, these programs have helped boys unlearn harmful gender norms, develop self-awareness, and become positive role models in their communities. In addition, we've partnered with key organizations to amplify our mission and advocate for systemic changes that support the holistic development of boys.













The statistics are clear, boys are struggling, and the consequences of inaction are severe. In South Africa, young men are 30% more likely to drop out of school than girls, while in Kenya, 73% of reported suicide cases involve men. Additionally, boys raised in environments that reinforce toxic masculinity are four times more likely to become perpetrators of gender-based violence. These alarming trends highlight why BQA's work is more critical than ever. By investing in boys today, we are shaping a future where young men can express vulnerability, pursue education without stigma, and contribute meaningfully to society.

As BQA relaunches, our vision is bolder than ever. With initiatives like the SABI Movement Platform, we aim to expand our digital impact, gamify learning around gender biases, and equip even more boys and men with the tools to challenge societal norms. Our commitment remains unwavering, to create a world where boys and young men are empowered, emotionally intelligent, and prepared to lead with empathy. Now, more than ever, we call on governments, organizations, and individuals to support this mission, ensuring that no boy is left behind.

Strategic Pillars of Impact

Leadership

The core objective of this Pillar of Impact is to reshape the way boys understand leadership—breaking free from the deeply ingrained stereotypes of masculine dominance and the damaging cycle of toxic masculinity that is often unconsciously passed down. The belief that men are made to lead while women are made to follow has fueled a systemic issue—one that births misogyny, inequality, and societal imbalance. At Boys Quarters Africa, we are committed to challenging this narrative by teaching boys that leadership is not about gender—it is about service. True leadership is rooted in character, competence, and contribution, not in being male. It is not an automatic right, nor is it defined by an innate desire for power or position. We believe that when boys are taught the right values, perspectives, and principles, their understanding of women, family, and society will shift for the better. To truly advance Gender Equality and Human Rights, we must start by redefining leadership at its foundation—ensuring that boys grow up recognizing leadership as a responsibility, not an entitlement. The future we seek begins with the minds we shape today.

Education

Through our Education Pillar, we are on a mission to empty the streets of Africa—rescuing young boys from the harsh realities of violence, exploitation, and neglect. No child should endure domestic, emotional, or sexual abuse. No boy should be stripped of his self-worth or future before he even becomes a man. At Boys Quarters Africa, we hold one fundamental belief: Every child must go to school. But education, to us, goes beyond textbooks and classrooms. It is not just about ABC or 123—it is about unlocking potential. Whether it is music, art, fashion, dance, or craftsmanship, we believe in transforming gifts into skills and garnishing them with values that prepare boys for a future of purpose and possibility. This commitment extends beyond borders and barriers. We are intentional about reaching boys with disabilities—especially in Northern Nigeria—ensuring that no child is left behind.

Because when we educate a boy, we don't just change his life—we change the future of Africa.



Empowerment

Through our Empowerment Pillar, we are rewriting the stories of young boys in correctional centers—transforming remorse into redemption and hopelessness into opportunity. At the heart of this mission is THE EXCHANGE—a year-long program designed to help boys trade their pain for purpose, weakness for strength, and past mistakes for a brighter future.

These boys didn't end up in remand homes by accident. Many are victims of circumstances—caught in cycles of violence, neglect, and survival. We don't just see their past; we see their potential. Through skills training, value reorientation, and mentorship, we equip them to become productive members of society. But transformation doesn't stop there. We envision a future where no rehabilitated boy is left without a home, a second chance, or a path forward. That's why we are building the Boys Quarters Safe Home—an end-to-end facility for transformation, mind reinvention, and future-skilling. More than just a shelter, it will be a launchpad for reintegration, legal aid, and sustainable empowerment. Our audacious goal? To establish these homes in 100 cities across Africa before 12 PM on December 31, 2030.Because true change is not just about rescue—it's about restoring dignity, rebuilding lives, and reimagining the future of African boys.

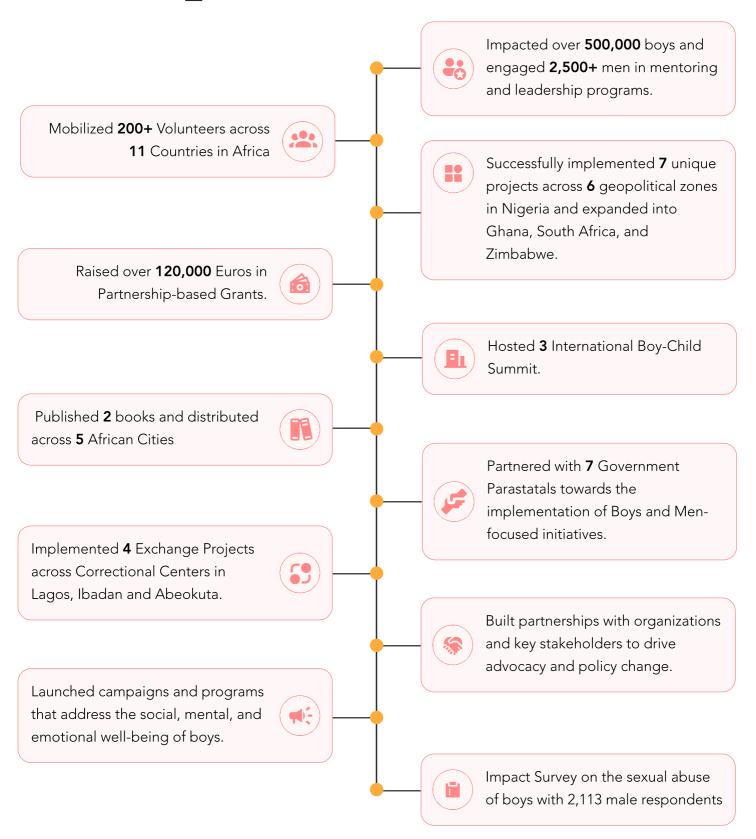
What started in December 2018 at the Special Correctional Centre for Boys, Lagos, is only the beginning. The revolution is here—and we are just getting started.

Advocacy

In our advocacy work, we uncovered a stark legal and societal contradiction—while rape is recognized as a crime, it is often emotionally and legally segregated to favor only one gender. Under the current Criminal and Penal Codes, rape is strictly defined as an offense against females, leaving countless male survivors invisible and unprotected. Only one law—the Violence Against Persons (VAP) Act—acknowledges rape as a crime that can be committed against both males and females. This gap in our legal framework is not just a technicality—it is a deep flaw in our pursuit of justice. We are advocating for an ideal society where wrong is wrong—regardless of who the victim is. Where rape is rape, not a crime defined by gender, but by the act itself. True justice must be blind to bias and bold enough to protect every survivor, male or female. The fight continues, and we will not stop until every voice is heard, every survivor is protected, and every law reflects fairness, equity, and true justice.

The road ahead is filled with opportunities, and we move forward with optimism, knowing that each boy we reach is a step toward a more balanced, inclusive, and empowered future for Africa. Our Impact through the years

2018

Laying the Foundation

Boys Quarters Africa (BQA) began its journey in **2018** with two flagship programs: the Exchange Project and the BoysToo Campaign. **The Exchange Project** was established to equip boys in correctional centers with ICT and vocational skills, addressing the significant lack of rehabilitation programs for incarcerated youth. In many African societies, young offenders are often abandoned by both the legal system and their families, with little to no opportunity for reintegration. This project aimed to break that cycle by providing them with tangible skills that could foster economic independence upon release. The **BoysToo Campaign** was designed to challenge prevailing gender norms that often ignore the struggles of boys, particularly in areas of mental health, emotional repression, and societal expectations.

Through these initiatives, BQA laid the groundwork for its broader mission: to create a society where boys are acknowledged, supported, and given the tools to thrive. The Exchange Project saw its first cohort of participants graduate with basic ICT skills, with some securing apprenticeships in local businesses. Meanwhile, the BoysToo Campaign gained traction from Ondo State, sparking conversations about the overlooked struggles of boys in African societies. These early successes demonstrated the urgency of BQA's work and set the stage for future growth.

2019

Strengthening the Mission

With the foundation laid, 2019 was focused on expanding impact and deepening engagement. The Exchange Project continued to run in correctional centers, refining its approach to better serve its participants. BQA introduced a mentorship component, pairing boys with professionals who could guide them on career paths and personal development. Recognizing the lack of systemic support for these young men, BQA also began conversations with policymakers and legal practitioners to advocate for more rehabilitation-focused approaches in the justice system.



Meanwhile, the BoysToo Campaign grew in scope, moving beyond online advocacy into physical outreach. Workshops were conducted in schools and community centers, educating boys on mental health, emotional intelligence, and self-awareness. Through these workshops, BQA found that many boys struggled with expressing vulnerability due to deeply ingrained cultural norms. This realization reinforced the need for dedicated spaces where boys could openly discuss their experiences without fear of judgment.

2020

Expanding Programs and Advocacy

2020 marked a pivotal year for BQA with the introduction of Guyversations, a program designed to create safe spaces for boys and young men to discuss their emotions, struggles, and aspirations. The initiative was born out of the realization that many boys lacked platforms where they could openly share their thoughts without societal expectations to "man up" and suppress their feelings. Guyversations provided a solution by fostering candid discussions on masculinity, identity, and mental health. The impact was immediate—many participants reported feeling relieved to finally have a space where they could talk freely. Another major milestone was the launch of Project SABI, aimed at addressing sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) from a male perspective. While much of the conversation around SGBV focuses on female survivors, BQA recognized that engaging boys and men as allies was crucial in driving lasting change. The project sought to educate boys on consent, respect, and healthy masculinity, working with transport unions, market associations, and local leaders to challenge harmful narratives. These two new initiatives positioned BQA as a thought leader in gender-inclusive advocacy, pushing the boundaries of traditional conversations.

2021

Scaling Impact and Hosting the First Boys Summit

In 2021, BQA scaled its advocacy efforts significantly by hosting the first-ever Boys Summit, a landmark event that brought together young boys, educators, parents, and policymakers to discuss the realities of growing up as a boy in African societies. The summit provided a platform for boys to share their experiences and for stakeholders to deliberate on policy interventions that could create a more supportive environment for male youth. Over 500 participants attended, and the discussions that emerged laid the groundwork for future institutional collaborations.



Alongside the Boys Summit, existing programs continued to thrive. Guyversations expanded into more communities, drawing in a larger audience of boys eager to participate in open discussions. Project SABI deepened its engagement with transport unions, while the BoysToo Campaign grew into a year-long advocacy initiative, reaching thousands of young people across different platforms. This year marked a significant turning point, as BQA transitioned from a grassroots initiative into a structured movement influencing broader societal narratives.

2022

Deepening Leadership and Capacity Building

Recognizing the need for structured leadership development among boys, BQA launched the Leadership Bootcamp, an intensive program designed to equip boys with critical leadership, communication, and life skills. The bootcamp aimed to challenge traditional notions of leadership, moving beyond hierarchical and authoritarian models to emphasize empathy, collaboration, and social responsibility. Participants engaged in mentorship sessions, problem-solving challenges, and real-world leadership exercises, leading to measurable improvements in confidence and decision-making abilities. In parallel, the BoysToo Campaign, Boys Summit, Guyversations, and Project SABI continued to flourish, with an increased emphasis on mentorship and personal development. This year also saw BQA solidify its research-driven approach, using data from program participants to refine its initiatives and develop more targeted interventions. The emphasis on leadership and capacity-building ensured that BQA wasn't just addressing immediate challenges but was also investing in a future generation of responsible and emotionally intelligent men.

2023

Strengthening Advocacy and Expanding Reach

By 2023, BQA had established itself as a key voice in the discourse on boyhood, masculinity, and gender inclusivity. The organization streamlined its focus to prioritize the BoysToo Campaign, Boys Summit, and Project SABI, ensuring these initiatives received the necessary resources for sustainable impact. This strategic decision allowed for deeper engagements and better program outcomes, rather than spreading efforts too thin across multiple smaller projects. A major highlight of the year was the Boys Summit, which saw increased participation from key stakeholders, including policymakers, corporate leaders, and international advocacy groups.



This summit not only provided boys with a platform to speak but also challenged institutions to reassess how they support young men. BQA's advocacy efforts led to partnerships with educational institutions, ensuring that mental health support and gender sensitivity training became more integrated into school curricula.

2024

Focused Growth and Strategic Engagement

The year 2024 focused on ensuring the sustainability and scalability of BQA's work. BoysToo remained a flagship campaign, with renewed advocacy for institutional reforms in education and mental health policies affecting boys. The Boys Summit, now an annual event, continued to grow, serving as a hub for policy discussions, mentorship programs, and cross-sector collaborations.

A key priority was securing long-term partnerships to sustain BQA's impact. The organization actively engaged policymakers, NGOs, and corporate sponsors, advocating for systemic changes in how boys' issues are addressed at national and continental levels. This strategic engagement positioned BQA not just as a youth-led initiative, but as a credible thought leader in the African advocacy landscape.



Impact Reach

Boys Quarters Africa has successfully penetrated all six geopolitical zones of Nigeria, ensuring that boys from diverse socioeconomic backgrounds have access to its programs. From urban centers like Lagos and Abuja to rural communities in Northern Nigeria, BQA has adapted its interventions to meet local needs. In the South-South and Southeast regions, where economic instability affects many young boys, BQA has provided vocational training and mentorship, equipping them with skills to break out of poverty cycles. In the North, where traditional gender norms often discourage male vulnerability, Guyversations has been instrumental in creating safe spaces for young boys to discuss their emotions without stigma.

Beyond Nigeria, BQA has expanded its reach to Ghana, South Africa, and Zimbabwe, collaborating with local organizations to contextualize its programs. In South Africa, where gender-based violence is a critical issue, Project SABI has played a crucial role in engaging men and boys in discussions about accountability and positive masculinity. In Ghana and Zimbabwe, mental health awareness initiatives have sparked necessary conversations about depression and emotional well-being among young men. These expansions highlight the universal nature of boys' struggles and the need for a continental movement to address these challenges holistically.





Our Partnerships

BQA's growth and success have been fueled by strategic partnerships with correctional facilities, educational institutions, media houses, corporate sponsors, and advocacy groups. These collaborations have amplified its advocacy efforts, allowing its campaigns to reach wider audiences and influence public discourse. Partnerships with legal organizations have helped push for more rehabilitation-focused approaches in correctional systems, while media alliances have given visibility to the struggles boys face.

Additionally, collaborations with schools and universities have enabled mentorship programs, ensuring that boys receive consistent guidance and support. Corporate sponsorships have provided funding, but beyond financial contributions, partners have also played active roles in mentoring, capacity-building, and policy engagement. These partnerships represent a shared commitment to rewriting the narrative on boyhood and masculinity in Africa, ensuring that BQA's impact is both deep and far-reaching.



















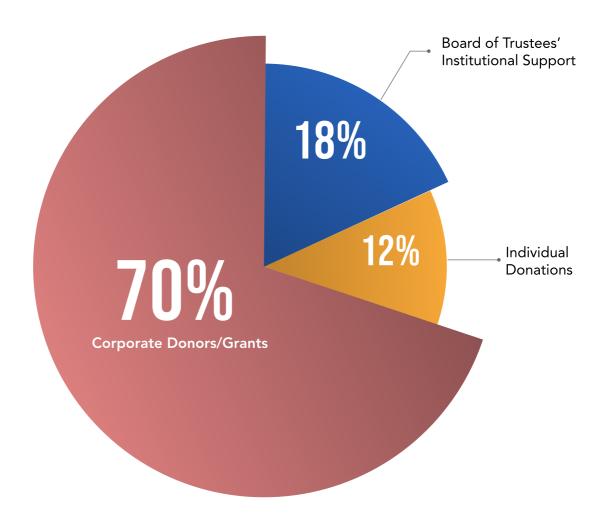


Financial Overview

Sources of Funding

Boys Quarters Africa received financial support from diverse sources, reflecting a strong network of partners and individuals who believe in our vision. Our funding sources are as follows:



Corporate donors and institutional grants constituted the bulk of our financial support, underscoring the confidence that established organizations have in our impact-driven initiatives. Individual contributions, though smaller in percentage, remain a vital source of grassroots support, while our Board of Trustees played a crucial role in sustaining our operations.



Overview of Financial Allocations

Our financial strategy is focused on maximizing impact while ensuring operational efficiency. The breakdown of our expenditures is as follows



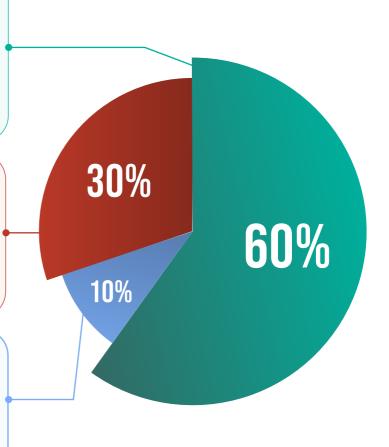
Direct project costs, including community outreach, training, capacity-building programs, and advocacy campaigns, accounted for the largest share of our expenditure. This reflects our commitment to ensuring that funds directly benefit the people and communities we serve.

Salaries, Allowances, and Stipends: 30%

A well-structured team is essential for driving our mission forward. This category includes staff salaries, field allowances, and stipends for program facilitators, ensuring that we retain dedicated professionals committed to the cause.

Capital Expenditure: 10%

Investments in technology, equipment, and infrastructure formed this category, enabling us to build sustainable systems that improve our efficiency and long-term impact.



Financial Impact and Sustainability

With strategic financial management, we have successfully scaled our projects, expanded our reach, and deepened our impact. Through effective cost allocation, we have:

- Increased program outreach across 5 Africa Countries, impacting over 500,000 individuals.
- Strengthened advocacy efforts leading to policy conversations.
- Established a more resilient operational structure to ensure long-term sustainability.

From the Car Park to Change Makers: The Impact of Project SABI on Men in Enugu and Women in Lagos

In the bustling car parks of Enugu, where the rhythm of everyday life is dictated by honking horns and hurried passengers, a quiet transformation was taking place.

Project SABI, an initiative designed to combat Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV) by reshaping mindsets and fostering accountability, had arrived in the heart of a space often overlooked in conversations about gender equality.

At first, the men—drivers, conductors, and park workers—were skeptical. Many had grown up in environments where gender roles were rigidly defined and conversations around consent, respect, and emotional intelligence were almost nonexistent. But as the sessions progressed, something changed.

Through interactive discussions, real-life case studies, and role-playing exercises, Project SABI dismantled longheld stereotypes and equipped these men with the knowledge and tools to become advocates for change—not just in their homes, but within their communities.





Women in Lagos: A Shift from Fear to Power

Meanwhile, in Lagos, a group of women engaged in market trading, domestic work, and informal businesses found their voices through Project SABI's community outreach. Many of these women had endured various forms of abuse and harassment but had never felt empowered to challenge it.

"For years, I just accepted that harassment was part of working in the market, But now, I understand my rights. I no longer stay silent, and I've taught my daughters to do the same."

The sessions in Lagos focused on self-advocacy, legal rights, and financial independence, ensuring that women were not only aware of their rights but empowered to exercise them. Several women formed support networks, holding each other accountable and providing a safe space for those experiencing abuse.

A Movement in Motion

From Enugu's car parks to Lagos' bustling markets, Project SABI is proving that change starts with awareness but is sustained by action. Men who once remained silent when witnessing violence are now intervening. Women who once felt powerless are now building communities of strength and resilience. The impact of Project SABI is not just in the statistics—it is in the lives transformed, the mindsets renewed, and the communities that are slowly becoming safer and more inclusive for all.

This is the beginning of a movement—one where men and women alike recognize that the fight against Sexual and Gender-Based Violence is a shared responsibility. As we scale Project SABI across Africa, the vision is clear—to mobilize three million people in this movement, ensuring that the next generation inherits a world where respect, dignity, and safety are not privileges, but rights for all.

Theory of Change

At the core of Boys Quarters Africa's work is the belief that when boys are supported, educated, and empowered, they grow into responsible, emotionally intelligent, and value-driven men who positively shape society. Our theory of change is built on a three-tier approach: **Awareness, Education, and Transformation**. We begin by challenging harmful social norms that pressure boys into silence, emotional suppression, and hypermasculinity. Through storytelling, campaigns, and dialogue-driven programs like Guyversations and the BoysToo Campaign, we create **awareness** about the struggles boys face, ranging from mental health issues to societal expectations that limit their potential. By shifting public perception and encouraging open discussions, we lay the groundwork for systemic change, fostering a culture where boys are seen and supported rather than dismissed.

The second tier, **Education**, ensures that boys are not just aware of their struggles but are also equipped with the knowledge and tools to navigate them effectively. Through initiatives like Project SABI, we engage boys in conversations around consent, gender-based violence, and healthy masculinity, reframing them not just as beneficiaries of change but as active participants in creating a more equitable society. Programs such as the Exchange Project and Leadership Bootcamp further equip boys with life skills, emotional intelligence, and leadership training, ensuring that they are not just reactive but proactive in shaping their futures. We also work with parents, teachers, and community leaders to create environments that reinforce positive growth and development, ensuring that support structures extend beyond our programs.

The final tier, **Transformation**, is where sustainable change takes root. By mentoring boys, advocating for policy changes, and creating leadership pipelines, BQA ensures that the boys we support today become the men who drive positive change tomorrow. Our programs are designed to have long-term ripple effects, whether it's a boy in a correctional center who learns a skill and reintegrates successfully, a













young man who becomes an advocate for mental health in his community, or a future father who raises his children with empathy and emotional intelligence. By shifting mindsets, equipping boys with knowledge, and embedding structural support systems, BQA is not just fixing a broken system; we are building a new one where boys can thrive, lead, and contribute meaningfully to society.

Boys Quarters Africa (BQA) tackles the challenges facing boys and young men with a bold, multi-dimensional approach that goes beyond traditional advocacy. Unlike many interventions that focus solely on immediate relief, BQA integrates awareness, education, and systemic change, ensuring that boys are not just supported but also equipped to thrive. One of our most innovative strategies is our storytelling-driven advocacy, which humanizes the struggles of boys through compelling narratives, testimonials, and media campaigns. By leveraging platforms like Guyversations, we create safe spaces for boys and men to engage in difficult but necessary conversations about masculinity, mental health, and emotional intelligence. Rather than using a confrontational approach, we engage boys and men as partners in change, encouraging them to reflect, unlearn, and take ownership of their personal and collective growth.

Additionally, our gamified and experiential learning approach ensures deeper engagement with our target audience. The SABI Movement Platform, for example, is designed to help men assess and challenge their biases through interactive assessments and educational content. Meanwhile, Project SABI takes learning out of traditional settings and into unconventional but high-impact spaces, such as motor parks and correctional centers, ensuring that boys and men in marginalized or overlooked communities also benefit. Our leadership development programs, like the Leadership Bootcamp, are built on a peer-to-peer mentoring model, reinforcing the idea that young men learn best from seeing positive role models within their communities. By combining strategic partnerships, digital innovation, and grassroots engagement, BQA is pioneering a scalable and sustainable approach to solving the boy child crisis—one that is deeply embedded in cultural realities while embracing modern, forward-thinking solutions.

BQA ensures that gender discussions are inclusive of boys and men, fostering a balanced approach to gender equity that benefits all. Additionally, through our Guyversations platform, we align with SDG 16, promoting peaceful and inclusive societies by addressing the root causes of toxic masculinity, emotional repression, and societal expectations that push boys toward crime, violence, and mental health struggles. By ensuring that boys and young men receive targeted support, mentorship, and resources, BQA contributes to a holistic, genderequitable, and sustainable future—one where all individuals, regardless of gender, can thrive.

OUR REFLECTION & OBSTACLES

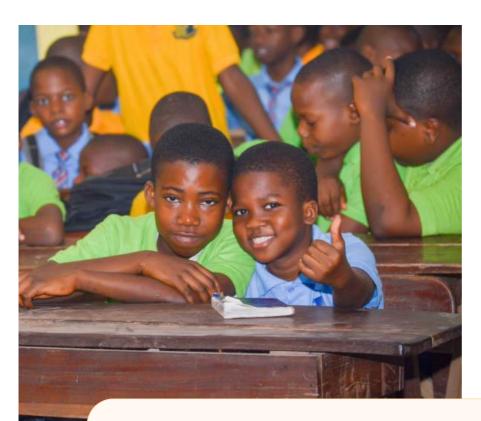

Despite these obstacles, BQA's commitment to its mission has allowed the organization to continually innovate and adapt in the face of adversity.

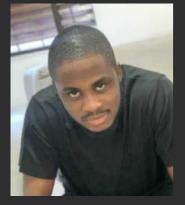

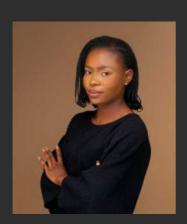
